## THEOREMS ON INTERPOLATION OF BESOV TYPE SPACES


#### Abstract

In the paper, two theorems of Riesz-Torin type are proved for the spaces $\bigcap_{i \in Q} \Lambda_{p_{i}, \theta_{i}}^{<m^{i}, N^{i}>}\left(G, \varphi^{i}\right)$, i.e. some properties of functions belonging to intersection of spaces

are studied from the point of view of imbedding theory.
Introduction. In the paper, two theorems of Riesz-Torin type are proved for the spaces

i.e. some properties of functions belonging to intersection of spaces

are studied from the point of view of imbedding theory.
Note that imbedding theorems for the spaces $\bigcap_{i \in Q} \Lambda_{p_{i}, \theta_{i}}^{<m^{i}, N^{i}>}\left(G, \varphi^{i}\right)$ (in the case $\lambda=1$ ) were studied in the paper [8], while the spaces $\bigcap_{i \in Q} \Lambda_{p, \theta}^{<m, N>}(G)$ were determined and studied in the papers of A.J. Jabrailov and M.Aliyev. The proof of the theorem in the considered paper is carried out by the integral representations method obtained in the paper [6]. The similar theorems for another functional spaces were proved in the papers [3], [6], [9], [10], [11].

Let $Q$ be a set of all possible vectors $i=\left(i_{1}, \ldots, i_{s}\right)$, with the coordinates $i_{k} \in\left\{0,1,2, \ldots, n_{k}\right\}(k=1,2, \ldots, s)$, and notice that the number of all possible vectors $i=\left(i_{1}, \ldots, i_{s}\right) \in Q$ equals $|Q|=\prod_{k=1}^{s}\left(1+n_{k}\right)$,therefore $(n+1) \leq|Q| \leq 2^{n},(n=$ $\left.n_{1}, \ldots, n_{s}\right)$ and let the vectors $m^{i}=\left(m_{1}^{i_{1}}, \ldots, m_{s}^{i_{s}}\right)$ and $N^{i}=\left(N_{1}^{i_{1}}, \ldots, N_{s}^{i_{s}}\right)$ with integer non-negative coordinate-vectors $m_{k}^{i_{k}}=\left(m_{k, 1}^{i_{k}}, \ldots, m_{k, n_{k}}^{i_{k}}\right) . N_{k}^{i_{k}}=\left(N_{k, 1}^{i_{k}}, \ldots, N_{k, n_{k}}^{i_{k}}\right)$ $(k=1,2, \ldots, s)$, i.e. $m_{k}^{i_{k}} \geq 0, N_{k}^{i_{k}} \geq 0(k=1,2, \ldots, s) ;\left|m^{i}\right|=\left|m_{1}^{i_{1}}\right|+\cdots+\left|m_{s}^{i_{s}}\right|$, $D^{m_{i}} f(x)=D_{1}^{m_{1}^{i_{1}}} \cdots D_{s}^{m_{s}^{i_{s}}} f\left(x_{1}, \ldots, x_{s}\right)$, and the mixed difference

be constructed on the vertices of a polyhedron entirely lying in the domain $G \subset E_{n}$, otherwise we assume $\Delta^{N^{i}}(t ; G) g(x)=0$.

Introduce a semi-norm in the space $\bigcap_{i \in Q} \Lambda_{p_{i}, \theta_{i}}^{\left\langle m^{i}, N^{i}>\right.}\left(G, \varphi^{i}\right)$ (in the special case a norm) by the equality

Notice that (for any $i=\left(i_{1}, \ldots, i_{s}\right) \in Q$ ) the vector function $\phi^{i}(t)=\left(\phi_{1}^{i_{1}}\left(t_{1}\right), \ldots, \phi_{s}^{i_{s}}\left(t_{s}\right)\right)$, with coordinate vector-functions $\phi_{k}^{i_{k}}\left(t_{k}\right)=\left(\phi_{k, 1}^{i_{k}}\left(t_{k, 1}\right), \ldots, \phi_{k, n_{k}}^{i_{k}}\left(t_{k, n_{k}}\right)\right)(k=1,2, \ldots, s)$, is such that $\phi_{k, j}^{i_{k}}\left(t_{k, j}\right)>0$ for $t_{k, j} \neq 0$, and $\phi_{k, j}^{i_{k}}\left(t_{k, j}\right) \downarrow 0$ for $t_{k, j} \downarrow 0\left(j=1,2, \ldots, n_{k}\right)(k=1,2, \ldots, s)$, the set $E_{\left|\varepsilon_{N^{i}}\right|}=\prod_{k \in \varepsilon_{N^{i}}} E_{\mid \varepsilon_{N_{k}^{i k}}^{i_{k}}} \mid$ for any

The subdomain $\Omega \subset G$ is said to be a subdomain satisfying the $\sigma$-semi-horm condition if there exists a vector $\delta=\left(\delta_{1}, \ldots, \delta_{s}\right)$ with cordinate vectors $\delta_{k}=\left(\delta_{k, 1}, \ldots, \delta_{k, n_{k}}\right)$ $\left(k \in e_{s}\right)$, therewith $\delta_{k, j}=1$ or $\delta_{k, j}=-1\left(j=1,2, \ldots, n_{k}, k \in e_{s}\right)$, for which

It is said that the domain $G \in C_{\varepsilon}(\sigma, H)=C_{\varepsilon}\left(H^{\sigma}\right)$ satisfies the "strong $\sigma$ horn condition" if $G \subset \bigcup_{\mu=1}^{N} G_{\mu}$ and it holds the condition $G \subset \bigcup_{\mu=1}^{N} G_{\mu, \varepsilon}$, where $G_{\mu, \varepsilon}=\left\{y: y \in G_{\mu}, \rho\left(y, G \backslash G_{\mu}\right)>\varepsilon\right\}$, i.e.the set of points $y \in G_{\mu}$, distant from $G \backslash G \mu$ by $\rho\left(y, G \backslash G_{\mu}\right)>\varepsilon>0$.

Main results. Let's prove two theorems of Riesz-Torin type for the functions from the spaces $\bigcap_{i \in Q} \Lambda_{p_{i}^{\lambda}, \theta_{i}}^{<\theta^{i}, N^{i}>}\left(G, \varphi^{i}\right)$.

Let $\beta_{\lambda} \geq 0, \sum_{\lambda=1}^{M} \beta_{\lambda}=1, \frac{1}{p_{i}}=\sum_{\lambda=1}^{M} \frac{\beta_{\lambda}}{p_{i}^{\lambda}}, \frac{1}{\theta_{i}}=\sum_{\lambda=1}^{M} \frac{\beta_{\lambda}}{\theta_{i}^{\lambda}}, m_{k, j}^{i_{k}}=\sum_{\lambda=1}^{M} \beta_{\lambda} m_{k, j}^{i_{k}}$.
Theorem 1. Let $G \in C_{\varepsilon}(a(h)), 1 \leq p_{i}^{\lambda} \leq q_{i}^{\lambda} \leq \infty, 1 \leq p_{i}^{\lambda} \leq \theta_{i}^{\lambda} \leq \infty \quad(\lambda=$ $1,2, \ldots, M, i \in Q) ; \nu=\left(\nu_{1}, \ldots, \nu_{s}\right)$ be an integer non-negative vector with coordinatevectors $\nu_{k}=\left(\nu_{k, 1}, \ldots, \nu_{k, n_{k}}\right)(k=1,2, \ldots, s)$, satisfy the condition in the case $i_{k}=0$, $\nu_{k, j} \geq m_{k, j}^{0}+N_{k, j}^{0}\left(j=1,2, \ldots, n_{k}\right) ;$ in the case $i_{k} \neq 0 \nu_{k, j} \geq m_{k, j}^{i_{k}}+N_{k, j}^{i_{k}}(j \neq$ $\left.i_{k}\right), \nu_{k, j}<m_{k, j}^{i_{k}}+N_{k, j}^{i_{k}}\left(j=i_{k}\right)$ for all $k=1,2, \ldots, s$ and for any $i=\left(i_{1}, \ldots, i_{s}\right) \in Q$ and $f \in \bigcap_{\lambda=1}^{M} \bigcap_{i \in Q} \Lambda_{p_{i}^{\lambda}, \theta_{i}^{\lambda^{\lambda}}}^{<m^{i^{\lambda}}}, N^{i^{\lambda}}>\left(G, \varphi^{i}\right)$.

\times \Phi_{i, \delta^{\mu}}\left(\frac{y}{a(\cdot)}, \frac{z}{a(\cdot)}\right) \frac{d y}{m e s\left(R_{\delta^{\mu}} \cdot E_{n}\right)} \tag{7}
\end{gather*}

for each $i=\left(i_{1}, \ldots, i_{s}\right) \in Q$ and for $\mu=1,2, \ldots, N$.
Notice that when the vector $N^{i}$ is a zero vector, for some $i \in Q$, instead of the function

under the integral we have the function

where $X=X\left(G_{\mu}+R_{\delta^{\mu}}\right)$ is a characteristic function of the set $G_{\mu}+R_{\delta^{\mu}}$.
The construction of auxiliary functions (6), (7) provides the following cycle of integral inequalities

whence it follows that the proof of the theorem is reduced to estimation of integral operators (7). On the other hand,

Applying the Holder inequality for $|F(x, v)|$ by the exponents

Represent the subintegrand function (10) in the form

where $\frac{1}{s^{\lambda}}=1-\frac{1}{p_{i}^{\lambda}}+\frac{1}{q^{\lambda}}$, apply again for $\left|F_{i}\right|$ the Holder inequality with the following exponents

$\chi$ is a characteristic function of the set $S\left(\Phi_{i, \delta}\right)$. Then taking into account (11) in relation (9), we get

Hence by means of inequalities (8) and (12) we get the required inequality (2).

Theorem 2. Let all the conditions of theorem 1 be satisfied, and further more $l=$ $\left(l_{1}, \ldots, l_{s}\right), r=\left(r_{1}, \ldots, r_{s}\right)$-be an integer non-negative vector with coordinate vectors $l_{k}=\left(l_{k, 1}, \ldots, l_{k, n_{k}}\right), r_{k}=\left(r_{k, 1}, \ldots, r_{k, n_{k}}\right), l_{k} \geq 0, r_{k} \geq 0$ and $\operatorname{supp}\left(l_{k}+r_{k}\right) \supset\left\{i_{k}\right\}$ for $i_{k} \neq 0(k=1,2, \ldots, s), \theta_{i} \leq \theta_{1}$; and also $\nu_{k, j}+l_{k, j} \geq m_{k, j}^{0}+N_{k, j}^{0} \quad\left(j=1,2, \ldots, n_{k}\right.$, $\left.i_{k}=0\right), \nu_{k, j}+l_{k, j} \geq m_{k, j}^{i_{k}}+N_{k, j}^{i_{k}}$ for all $i_{k} \neq 0\left(j \neq i_{k}\right) ; \nu_{k, j}+l_{k, j}<m_{k, j}^{i_{k}}+N_{k, j}^{i_{k}}$ $(k=1,2, \ldots, s) i \in Q$, and the infiniteness of the inetgral expression

for $i_{k} \neq 0$ be assumed.
Then in the domain $G$ there exist generalized derivatives $D^{\nu} f$, for which the inequalities

are valid.
Proof. For obtaining estimation (13), it suffices to estimate the norm

where $\widetilde{B}_{i, \delta^{\mu}, G_{\mu}+R_{\delta \mu}} f$ are obtained from $B_{i, \delta^{\mu}, G_{\mu}+R_{\delta \mu}} f$ if instead of $\nu$ we take $\nu+l$.
As in the proof of theorem 1 we get

\end{equation*}
$$

Applying the Holder inequality with the exponents $\alpha_{1}=\frac{q^{\lambda} p_{i}^{\lambda}}{q^{\lambda}-p_{i}^{\lambda}}, \alpha_{2}=q^{\lambda}, \alpha_{3}=\frac{p_{i}^{\lambda}}{p_{i}^{\lambda}-1}$, we get

\left\|\Delta^{r}\left(\frac{z}{r}, G\right) \widetilde{B}_{i, \delta^{\mu}, G_{\mu}+R_{\delta \mu}} f\right\|_{L_{q^{\lambda}}(G)} \leq \\
\leq C_{1} \prod_{k=1}^{s} H_{k, i_{k}}\left(h_{k}, l_{k}\right)\left\|\Delta^{N^{i}}\left(\frac{z}{N^{i}}, G_{\mu}+R_{\delta^{\mu}}\right) D^{m^{i}} f\right\|_{p_{i}^{\lambda}, G_{\mu}+R_{\delta \mu^{\prime}}} .
\end{gathered}
$$

Substituting this inequality in inequalities (14) and (15), for $\theta_{i} \leq \theta(i \in Q)$, we get the required inequality.

The theorem is proved.
